HOST PASTOR AND VENUE

CEP is made possible through sacrificial partnership with a host church and pastor.

Requirements for a Host Church:

- Rather centrally located to the pastors who are planning to attend,
- Of sufficient size to provide accommodation, meals, and sufficient classroom space, and
- A very similar stand to BJMBC in its doctrine, philosophy of worship, standards of holiness, and commitment to a separatist ministry.

Responsibilities of Host Church and Pastor:

- Provide or facilitate accommodation and meals. BJMBC recommends that the host pastor charge CEP students a certain amount to assist with the cost of meals for the week.
- Act as local liaison between CEP students and BJMBC.
- Assist during the week of class: help with the arrival and departure of students, photocopying class materials (BJMBC will reimburse any expenses), overseeing the registration process, and setting up the classroom.





DEGREES OFFERED

<u>Master of Ministry</u> — for pastors with a bachelor's degree (secular or religious) who successfully complete 32 academic units in the CEP program.

<u>Diploma in Graduate Studies</u> — for pastors who do <u>not</u> have a bachelor's degree but who successfully complete 32 academic units in the CEP program. If sometime after receiving the Diploma in Graduate Studies the candidate earns a bachelor's degree, his Diploma may be upgraded to Master of Ministry.

Certificate in Graduate Studies — for pastors who satisfactorily attend at least 32 academic units of the CEP program, but fail to complete all the required assignments.

Class Format and Schedule

One week modules held four times per year:

July/August	Last week of July or first week of August
October	2 nd or 3 rd week of October
January	1 st or 2 nd full week of January
March	1 st or 2 nd week of March

Weekly schedule is normally as follows:

Monday- Thursday	Six Class Hours
FRIDAY	Four Class Hours (often ending by lunch time)

Typically, classes start at 8 am on Monday. If arrival time on Monday is a problem, we can start later in the day and end later on Friday.



PROFESSORS/INSTRUCTORS

- BJMBC "missionary" professors
- BJMBC "national" professors
- Guest professors (usually visiting pastors from another country).

All CEP professors will have completed at least a Master's degree, be exemplary in character, and evidence a commitment to baptistic fundamentalism.

Cost

- **1. Academic (Credit):** P700-950 per class. Early bird discounts are available. Price includes tuition, class syllabus, most materials, **and meals**.
- 2. Sit-In (Audit): Students/Pastors may opt to sit in for free and enjoy the lectures. They will receive no academic credit and will complete no assignments. They may purchase the class syllabus, assuming extra copies are available.



Academic Expectations

- Students will earn 32 academic units by attending 16 one-week modules. An extra module or two will often be offered as substitutes for those who missed a class.
- Each one-week class is approximately 28 hours of in-class instruction and earns two units of academic credit at BJMBC.
- 3. Students should expect an out-of-class work load of approximately 40-50 hours. Out-of-class assignments may be due either before or after the one-week module. Students who fail to complete all requirements for a module within six months after the last day of that class will forfeit academic credit for that module. Since assignments will be submitted by email, students are expected to have an email account.
